### ABSTRACT

The present research project aims to offer a contribution to the Ecuadorian subtitling and audiovisual industry through the rendering of the English subtitles for the Visión 360 documentary "La herencia de Odebrecht Parte 1" produced by Ecuavisa. This documentary was selected among a wide range of possibilities for its political and informative nature. The information it presents is only available in Spanish despite its international relevance; therefore, in consultation with Ecuavisa, the pertinent authorization was arranged and granted for an academic interlinguistic transfer of the contents. The rendering process was carried out considering the linguistic and technical parameters, as well as the constraints related to this type of translation. All the aforementioned elements have been analyzed along with the translator's choices and strategies used to accurately convey the message of the source text.

### **1. INTRODUCTION**

It is universally acknowledged that in modern societies, the necessity of information dissemination has become more tangible. Technological advances, the Internet, and globalization have contributed to the dissolution of communication barriers. Accessing information has become a simple matter due to the availability of content in different languages, especially in English. Most readers and internet users look for information in this language and the majority of news are also broadcasted in the aforementioned language.

Worldwide media has realized the importance of producing and making information available in English. Nowadays, more TV programs and online news are translated into the English language so as to have more viewers. The translation field acts as a bridge between people from different geographical regions and cultural background. It enables information to travel from place to place by making it more accessible for a broader audience.

The current project presents the audiovisual translation product of a journalistic documentary: "La Herencia de Odebrecht Parte 1", taken from the program Visión360, an Ecuadorian TV production that presents topics of popular interest; in this particular case, the worldwide corruption scandal of the multinational Odebrecht, in which several countries were involved.

Aspects such as text styles, terminological coherence, cultural parameters, and possible constraints and techniques to tackle them were taken into consideration for the rendering and subtitling processes, as well as for the post analysis of the decision-making process of the translation.

### 2. JUSTIFICATION

According to the Internet World Stats (IWS, 2019) 1,105 millions of Internet users speak the global language. Therefore, it can be understood that the amount of information found in the web is mostly in English, thus, most online searches are also done in this language.

In the light of the aforementioned facts, transforming any content into a more reachable form so that more users can acknowledge it has become an obligation rather than a privilege. In fact, the beneficial nature of English-subtitled videos not only applies to viewers who do not speak the language, but also to English speakers who watch these types of videos even when they are spoken in their first language due to the increase of their engagement levels and the situational necessity of watching videos with sound off (Griffin, 2015).

This data has raised awareness in the audiovisual industry. Every day, more videos either in websites, social networks, or television channels are becoming accessible to a broader audience (Matamala, 2009b). Bearing this in mind, sources of information of any type have the necessity to become global, and thus, the job of the translator starts. It is their duty to deal with all the possible challenges that might arise when creating quality works that preserve information in time, and also spread it to every corner of the world.

Odebrecht corruption scandal has affected several countries, including Ecuador. Surprisingly, information of such type and specificity is not available in the English language, therefore, many people around the world do not have access to it. For this reason, this project carries out the rendering process of a documentary that exposes this corruption case in Ecuador. In this way, awareness of the magnitude of corruption in this country will be raised.

### 3. DELIMITATION OF THE PROBLEM

Translating a journalistic documentary, or any other genre, requires knowledge, extensive research, and domain of conventions, which will come useful during the translation process. The translator of a journalistic documentary will have to build new journalistic texts that are inserted in a specific linguistic and cultural tradition, which is governed by parameters different from the original language and culture, and at the same time, convey the message with the most important aim of this type of work in mind: to communicate.

Some documentaries present technical terminology or other complexities; for this reason, the use of specialized terms in this kind of journalistic production presupposes a challenge for the translators. Similarly, it is common to encounter some obstacles in translating topics of current relevance or relatively new topics because of the lack of research and information. Exhaustive investigation and documentation before beginning the translation process must be carried out.

The subtitling of documentaries is subject to all the factors linked to audiovisual translation: the new text must adapt to the tones (intentions) of visual narration and allow a fluent reading to the speaker. In addition, timing issues must also be tackled by the translators for the documentary to be understandable. These and the aforementioned challenges will be described and analyzed in the present study.

# 4. RESEARCH QUESTIONS

- What are the most common constraints found in the rendering of a documentary?
- What method should be considered for the rendering of an Ecuadorian documentary from Spanish into English?
- What techniques should be applied in the transfer of the Visión 360 documentary from Spanish into English?

# 5. GENERAL OBJECTIVE

To contribute to the Ecuadorian subtitling and audiovisual industry with the annotated translation and the English subtitling of the documentary LA HERENCIA DE ODEBRECHT PARTE 1 through the identification of relevant constraints and the analysis of the strategies used in the translation process.

# 6. SPECIFIC OBJECTIVES

- Establish a background of the journalistic documentary to be translated so as to raise awareness on its international relevance
- Analyze the method, strategies and techniques used to overcome the challenges and constraints found in the translation process of the documentary chosen.
- Write the subtitles of the documentary considering the salient features of the text.

### 7. LITERATURE REVIEW

### 6.1 THE MEANING OF WORDS

When translating a text, it is necessary to bear in mind the importance of meaning and how a specific choice can affect the whole product, and the way the audience reacts towards it. According to Cruise (as cited in Baker, 2011), there are four main types of meaning. These are propositional meaning, expressive meaning, presupposed meaning, and evoke meaning.

Propositional Meaning describes the relation between the reference in the real world and the word being used in the language of the speakers and what it represents to them. Expressive Meaning tells others about the author of the utterance feelings and emotions, and their intention. Therefore, an utterance has propositional meaning, but when it is put into context, its expressive meaning may vary. Presupposed Meaning presents expectations for word usage according to the context. Evoked meaning is related to the word choice in accordance with the context of situation, the audience, and what is considered appropriate for the group involved in the conversation. This last factor can vary from language to language (Baker, 2011). For example, the word 'silly' in English is translated into Spanish as 'tonto', their propositional meaning is similar. Nevertheless, the expressive meaning in the latter word is going to depend on the context and the intention of the author, as well as the type of audience or receptor they have.

Evoked meaning involves concepts of dialect and register. Dialect may be geographical (according to the place that is being used), temporal (time when using such expressions), or social (mainly related to the social classes of the audience involved in the conversation). Register implies the choice of words according to some parameters such as tenor, which consists on who is speaking and the relation that a person has with the rest of the speakers, and field, which is the subject area the utterance belongs to. As an example, it could be said that when talking about a word problem in a math

lesson inside a classroom will imply the use of a certain type of language by both teacher and students, not only because of the field, but also because of the tenors (Baker, 2011).

### 6.2 DEFINITION AND CLASSIFICATION OF TRANSLATION

The term translation has been defined by many academics: it can refer to a subject field, to the product, which is the text that has been rendered, or the process, which refers to the act of translating. Munday (2013) states that the translation process among two different written languages "involves the translator changing an original written text (...) in the original verbal language (...) into a written text (...) in a different verbal language (...)" (p. 5). Following the previous order, these concepts will be addressed as source text (ST), source language (SL), target text (TT), and target language (TL) in the present paper. Translating from one language to another is the most common type of translation. Nevertheless, it is not the only one.

Jakobson (as cited by Munday, 2013) has classified translation into three types: Interlingual or translation proper, intralingual, and intersemiotic translation. Interlingual translation is the actual transfer process from one language into another. For example, the rendering of the English word "politics" into Spanish as "política". In contrast, Intralingual Translation is the rewording or paraphrasing of the verbal signs, to put a chunk of words in another form, but using the same code or language. This is, reshaping the language due to a variety of reasons, such as the necessity of caption in sensory impaired people, or only because a person wants to watch a video with the sound off. Intersemiotic Translation is the interpretation of verbal signs into non-verbal signs; that is, to translate written text into an artistic product. For instance, the musical representation of a book, such as the musical adapted from the classic literary work Pride and Prejudice.

### 6.3 AUDIOVISUAL TEXTS AND AUDIOVISUAL TRANSLATION

There are many types of texts and genres that can be transferred into countless languages. One of the most relevant nowadays might be audiovisual texts for the amount of multimedia content available not only on TV, but also in online sources. Access to this type of text from mobile phones, computers, and other technological devices is clear-cut. Most people use it to stay informed and as a source of entertainment.

The verbal message or text is a relevant element within audiovisual translation. For this reason, both subtitling and dubbing are processes related to translating audiovisual verbal messages. One of the most important characteristics of an audiovisual text is that the message is transmitted using two channels, first the acoustic and then the visual; these two can be verbal or non-verbal and all these characteristics combined together result in the audiovisual text (Eduard, 2016).

### 6.3.1 TERMINOLOGY IN AUDIOVISUAL TRANSLATION

Terminology, as a discipline whose objective is the study and compilation of specialized terms; it is not a recent subject, since the elaboration of vocabularies and terminological glossaries comes from much earlier. The history of terminology accompanies the evolution of knowledge and reflects the development and structure of the different societies (Alcina, Gamero, & Muñoz, 2002). According to Leon (as cited by Matamala, 2010), "the language of specialised texts and audiovisual products that deal with a specialised topic differs because scientific processes are explained differently according to the presumed previous knowledge of the target audience" (p.3-4). Cabre (2003) believes that discourse addressed by specialists to some specific audience or recipients contains terminological units.

Terminology and Translation have a close relationship. Terminology helps translators realize many concepts such as the notion of *term* and variation, which is convenient when dealing with terms in context and finding the most accurate equivalents. Matamala (2010) mentions in her research Cabre's proposal of a list of the main terminological challenges faced by translators:

Concerning the terminology of the source language:

(a) knowing or specifying the meaning of a TU from the source text; (b) confirming its specialised nature; (c) knowing its denominative alternatives and the conditions in which they are used in texts. (p.5)

### Concerning the terminology of the target language:

(a) knowing if there is an equivalent TU in the target language;
(b) if so, knowing what resources can or must be used in order to adapt or create a reasonable denomination and how to indicate that it is a neologism; (c) knowing the most adequate equivalent unit taking into account the topic and the approach; (d) knowing if a term has specific or restrictive grammatical usages; (e) knowing the prototypical combination of terms; (f) knowing the usual phraseology in the field;
(g) knowing denominative alternatives for a single concept and their pragmatic conditions making sure that the selected denominative unit corresponds exactly to the concept, etc. (p.5)

Matamala (2009b) accepts the distinction proposed by Cabre of Terminology in vitro vs. terminology in vivo; referring to the fact that the translator might have to choose whether to use the equivalent proposed by linguistic authorities, found in terminological or lexicographical works (in vitro), or the unit used by specialists in the field, which might be loanwords (in vivo).

Cabre (as cited by Matamala, 2009b) states, everything is related to translation decisions. Nevertheless, it is important to highlight the fact that there are terminological databases that speed the job of the translator.

# 6.3.2 CONSTRAINTS IN THE TRANSLATION OF AUDIOVISUAL TEXTS

There are specific constraints due to the audiovisual nature of the product. Matamala (2009b) presents an analysis of this phenomenon and concludes that:

Firstly, TU sometimes refer to objects visible on the screen and the degree of referentiality is very high (Chaume 2003:195); hence, translators cannot choose omission as a translation strategy and they must synchronise the text with the image. Secondly, the ephemeral nature of audiovisual products —which must be understood immediately because the audience cannot stop and look up a term on a dictionary — compels translators to choose strategies which enhance comprehension (Espasa 2004:193). Thirdly, terms are received orally and this is why the script contains indications concerning the pronunciation of difficult terms addressed to the voice artists who read the script. Finally, audiovisual translators might have to work with erroneous transcriptions or even without a script. (p.16)

Toury (as cited by Bogucki, 2004) states that there are a lot of constraints in audiovisual translation as well, and adds that there also exist some norms called "Matricial Norms", which help the translator decide when a given source text should be dubbed, subtitled or voiced-over. However, he also states that there are advantages and downsides of having these rules available. On the one hand, he states that "norms assist the translator in the daunting task of making choices" (p.72). On the other hand, he sustains that "the temporal, spatial and other restrictions imposed on the screen translator narrow down the range of possible equivalents and translation strategies to an absolute minimum" (p.72).

### 6.4 DOCUMENTARIES AND AUDIOVISUAL TRANSLATION

Documentaries are defined and redefined over the course of time, both by makers and by viewers. Nichols (2001) states that documentaries open a person's eyes to ongoing issues of the world, providing a cinematic view of the world. Social issues and current events, recurring problems and possible solutions can be portrayed in documentaries. "The bond between documentary and the historical world is deep and profound. Documentary adds a new dimension to popular memory and social history" (Nichols, 2001, p. 2).

Matamala (2009a) states that documentaries differ from other types of texts in the sense that they are aimed to mainly inform, rather than entertain:

In this sense, documentaries are, from my own point of view, a bit different from other products, in so far as the core element is information, whereas in fiction films inaccuracies and mistakes are not so important, since the audience generally assumes they are not watching a real story (p.5)

Documentaries are such a specialized work that they should be treated with special attention due to the different challenges presented at the time of their translation and meticulous analysis because of their complexity and depth on a specific topic (Matamala, 2010).

# 6.4.1 TRANSLATION OF DOCUMENTARIES, CONSTRAINTS AND STRATEGIES

The translation of a documentary is completely different from translating a series or a television program. Documentaries usually deal with different perspectives and contain information with more specialized topics; apart from this, documentaries are supposed to facilitate the access to information for the viewers. It is very frequent and common to see in documentaries interviews with experts, graphic documents or audiovisual media, among other resources. (Paredes, Reta, & Scroca, 2016)

Additionally, in most documentaries, a narrator participates guiding the viewer towards the exposed information, who represents the figure responsible for carrying the argument. The tone of voice of the narrator is

usually more accentuated and formal than that of the protagonists of a series. (Paredes, Reta, & Scroca, 2016)

In addition, interviews play an important role in the audiovisual format of documentaries. The objective of the interview is to be one of the main sources of data collection on the subject developed. The interview can also reveal personal information and emotional nuances that are not always so visible if a written document is analyzed, and this gives a clue to the translator on how to interpret the data in a more accurate way (Paredes, Reta, & Scroca, 2016). Documentaries have a wide range of subject fields and for this reason, the terminology used in them is varied. Matamala (2010) explains the complexity of this type of translation:

Science documentaries popularise many scientific issues, using in general somewhat specialised speakers located in carefully chosen environments or contexts, and address various types of audiences. These four elements (topics, speakers, contexts and audiences) open a wide array of possibilities which are given a concrete shape in the audiovisual product: an off-screen narrator addressing a lay audience with a planned discourse, a scientist addressing the camera in a semiplanned situation, a specialist talking spontaneously to a colleague, or a lecturer giving a course on a specialised topic to advanced learners are just a few examples. Despite their varied nature, the finished films will always aim to popularise a specialised topic and, most importantly, to entertain the audience. (p.3)

In relation of constraints, Matamala (2010) analyzes documentaries and proposes a list of problem categories including:

Identifying terms in the ST; Understanding terms in the ST; Finding an equivalent in the TL; Dealing with variation, which can be challenging in the translation of technology topics; Overcoming the absence of an equivalent in the TL; Dealing with ambiguity in both, SL and TL; Managing equivalents for lay audiences. (p.5)

The most concerning points from the aforementioned constraints, and the ones that the present project will analyze are:

**Identifying a term:** Even when it seems straightforward, identifying a term when the form coincides with a word that comes from a general language, is a complex duty. Being able to identify a term that might be challenging to translate is a skill that translators must develop (Matamala, 2010).

**Understanding a term:** Sometimes translators choose to adapt the meaning of a phrase. Due to the difficulty in understanding some terms, this would lead them to rethinking a phrase or perhaps replace the term with another of clearer meaning. This shows that the translator cannot always find a precise equivalent and has to adapt the paragraph completely (Matamala, 2010).

**Finding the right equivalent:** To find and choose the correct equivalent, translators add references from specialized sources in the notes of the translation, so that the editor does not need to continue investigating the terms within this process. The sources can be specialized dictionaries, terminology databases or specialized websites (Matamala, 2010).

Absence of an adequate equivalent: It is not surprising that sometimes translators cannot find the most convenient or correct equivalents due to the lack of time to access dictionaries or specialized websites. In this situation what they choose is to use strategies that allow them to tackle this problem. Some strategies are matching the ST term with a new term, paraphrasing, or using loanwords (Matamala, 2010).

Some of the strategies used to tackle terminological problems are (a) adapting the translation to the time and language culture (it is necessary to be aware of the audience as well), (b) using a more general term that can be understood by a broader audience, (c) proposing an equivalent of the term. (Matamala, 2010, p.15)

These techniques are used when the main problem is understanding the original source. Nevertheless, when the absence of an equivalent is presented as a challenge, the strategies proposed by Matamala (2010) are:

(1) paraphrasing the original source, (2) proposing a terminological neologism, or creating a new term, but it is necessary to be aware of the cultural background of the audience in order to make the product understandable. In some languages and cultures different from English, the terminological neologism is not well considered. For instance, in Spanish, words are not freely created since they are regulated by an institution (RAE). (3) Using loanwords is the most used and accepted mechanism to solve translation issues. (p.15)

# 6.4.2 VISIÓN 360 DOCUMENTARY "LA HERENCIA DE ODEBRECHT PARTE 1"

Visión360 is a documentary program produced by the Ecuadorian TV channel Ecuavisa. It presents and analyzes a variety of issues or topics of national and international interest. The presenter is Tania Tinoco, a well-known and respected reporter in Ecuador. It is an award-winning program inside and outside the country due to its thriving audience and quality of delivery.

The selection analyzed in the present project, named "La Herencia de Odebrecht Parte 1", depicts an international corruption case that gained popularity after the U.S. Department of Justice intervened. This institution released a list with names of people that had contributed to the expansion of a Brazilian construction enterprise called Odebrecht by means of illegal businesses. This case has a high relevance not only in Ecuador, but also in the twelve other countries that are part of the scheme since high-ranking officials are said to be involved.

The type of language used by reporters is of a well-developed journalistic type, citing all sources from where they take the information, leaving no room for improvisation. It is previously rehearsed and read from a script prepared by journalists with anticipation. Another important aspect to keep in mind is the educational background of the interviewees, who use their professional skills to express themselves formally, using legal and

financial terms to express themselves when talking; unlike reporters, they do not count on resources such as scripts, but they speak using knowledge at the time of being interviewed.

### 6.5 SUBTITLING CONSTRAINTS AND METHODOLOGIES

Subtitling is said to be much more complex than any other type of transference process; therefore, translation loss is a risk that translators will need to deal with. Gottlieb (as cited by Farid and Janin, 2010) has divided constraints on subtitling into formal and textual. The former are linked to the visual representation of the film while the latter are related to space and time restrictions. Bearing this in mind, Bogucki (2004) concludes that "subtitling has to do without a range of complex structures" (p.72). Factors such as technical restrictions on the length and amount of lines and the visual complementation of the text on screen are some of the challenges when translating audiovisual texts.

Subtitling is influenced by relevant aspects of the culture in which it is working. These aspects represent facts that influence the minds of the readers in the source language settings. Something very important that must be considered is that due to the close interrelation between language and culture, interlingual subtitling problems might arise at the time of translating the cultural references of oral dialogue into written subtitles (Altahri, 2013).

Taylor (2000), in his research "The Subtitling of Film: reaching another community" states that subtitles "must follow a 'blow-by-blow' sequence, hence running the risk of losing the overall global view" (p.316), which is reflected at the moment of spotting each caption in the corresponding section of the film. It differs from a written translation, which can "summarise, explain or otherwise maintain the holistic picture" (p.316).

Matamala (2010) argues that "translators sometimes work with a transcription of the audiovisual product. However, these transcriptions do sometimes contain mistakes and this can result in problems" (p.14). Therefore, it is very important to bear in mind that in spite of the mistakes, the

translator may find in the source text, he or she should know how to deal with them.

There are some methodologies to issue the audiovisual transfer process of subtitling. For instance, Sánchez (as cited by Orero, 2004) mentions that she has identified four subtitling methods:

- 1. Pre-translation Adaptation Spotting
- 2. Pre-translation Spotting Adaptation
- 3. Adaptation Spotting Translation
- 4. Translation/Adaptation Spotting

The first method is Pre-translation - Adaptation - Spotting. This method uses a translated script or adapted to subtitle units before being spotted. Then, the subtitle adjuster can adapt the translation into subtitles, check meaning, and summarize if necessary.

The second method is Pre-translation - Spotting - Adaptation. The film or program is spotted before adapting the pre-translated text. The subtitler first identifies the subtitle units and adapts the translated text later. For the present project, this method has been used.

The third method is Adaptation - Spotting - Translation. It allows to translate subtitles into various languages simultaneously, without spotting each language. The translator can also summarize and omit information as necessary.

The fourth and last method is Translation/Adaptation - Spotting. In this method, translation and adaptation are simultaneously performed before spotting, or vice versa.

She also states that "regardless of the method, each project undergoes a two-step verification process" (Orero, 2004, p.10). The first step is to ask a native to read the file without watching the video in order to identify incoherence and grammatical mistakes. The second step is to make him or her watch the video with the complete subtitles. Thus, any final adjustments can be made to the work.

### 6.5.1 SUBTITLING TECHNIQUES IN DOCUMENTARIES

In the book "Discourse and Community" (Ventola, 2000), several authors have come together to analyze varied situations in which discourse is involved. Gottlieb (as cited in Ventola, 2000) identified ten techniques that help the translator reduce a text to subtitles, and which he classifies as: expansion, paraphrase, transfer, imitation, transcription, dislocation, condensation, decimation, deletion, and resignation. Taylor (2000) also talks about each one and summarizes them:

Examining each in turn, expansion is used when the original requires an explanation because of some cultural nuance not retrievable in the target language; paraphrase is resorted to in cases where the phraseology of the original cannot be reconstructed in the same syntactic way in the target language; transfer refers to the strategy of translating the source text completely and correctly; imitation even maintains the same forms, typically with names of people and places; transcription is used in those cases where a term is unusual even in the source text, for example the use of a third language or nonsense language; dislocation is adopted when the original employs some sort of special effect, for example a silly song in a cartoon film, where the translation of the effect is more important than the content; condensation would seem to be the typical strategy used, that is the shortening of the text in the least obtrusive way possible, but as we shall see later, this is not necessarily the case; decimation is an extreme form of condensation where, perhaps for reasons of discourse speed, even potentially important elements are omitted; deletion refers to the total elimination of parts of a text; resignation describes the strategy adopted when no translation solution can be found and meaning is inevitably lost. (p.319)

### 8. METHODOLOGY

For the present study, the qualitative research method has been used to analyze different criteria based on the Holmes' framework of Processoriented Descriptive Translation Studies, which focuses on interpreting the translator's choices rather than focusing on linguistic matters. In other words, an extensive description of the reasons of the translators' lexical selection will be observed in this project. Regarding the translation itself, it must be clarified that the accumulation of different techniques used in this rendering led the researchers to classify the final product as a communicative translation since it intends to achieve a similar contextual meaning in both source and target audience.

The documentary analyzed in this paper is of journalistic genre. Documentaries differ from other type of sources in many ways. The target audience of documentaries is expected to have an educated background; they need to be aware of the political situation of their country, or at least have an idea of the importance of what is being discussed in order to understand it. Therefore, the register and the choice of words are some of the aspects a translator should consider when translating a text. Furthermore, the translation process of the script of the documentary is the first part of the complete task. The next part is to subtitle the video, this is, taking into consideration not only meaning and context, but also timing issues and other technical parameters such as a different kind of punctuation.

It is important to highlight the fact that the model used for analyzing the constraints of translating a documentary is the one established by Matamala (2010), which states that identifying and understanding terms, as well as finding and overcoming the absence of equivalents for those terms are the most relevant challenges a translator must face. Regarding the subtitling method used in the present project, the one proposed by Sanchez was chosen, where a pre-translated text or transcript is used, then it is spotted in the video to be finally adapted or edited.

It should be noted that a table containing all the necessary elements for the translation analysis was employed to debrief the most relevant chunks of this transfer process, these are, the source text or transcript of the documentary, the target text or the translation itself, and finally the subtitled version, once it has been spotted in the video and adapted to its format, following the already established parameters for subtitling:

The interpretation of the source text includes the consideration of contextual situations, the challenges or constraints linked to this type of translation, and the techniques used by the translators to tackle these difficulties.

### 9. FINDINGS

There are several aspects to be considered in the analysis of this translation. The audience to which the program is delivered, the type of program it is, the level of relevance of the content of the program as well as the target audience of the translation are aspects that do not only give a better understanding of the translation choices of the author, but also promote understanding of the relevance of the program itself. It is important to highlight the fact that this TV program is a journalistic documentary that depicts a political issue. Therefore, factors like specialized terminology, register, and tone, as well as the formality level and function of the program have been taken into consideration.

Once the guidelines for analyzing the source and target language and the source and target text were established, the most relevant samples representing the aforementioned elements were extracted from the transcript. These samples are presented with their explanations considering the strategies used. A comparison between the target text and the subtitled version, after spotting and adaptation completion are included.

It is very important to begin the analysis looking at the equivalences chosen, and the decisions made in relation to the type of context situation presented in this documentary. Even though the level of formality used by the presenter is high in almost all of the product, the greetings that she uses give a sense of warmth to the audience, creating empathy. As it was previously mentioned, Tania Tinoco is a very well-known journalist, with a long professional career in the Ecuadorian television. People know her very well and respect her. Due to her level of seriousness, she needs to find a way to connect with the audience. Therefore, Tania Tinoco greets in a very cordial and semi- formal way using the expression "**Amigos bienvenidos**"<sup>1</sup>. The word "amigos" creates a boundary between the presenter and the audience; it creates empathy. This level of comfort is accepted in the Ecuadorian culture, but in the target culture, documentaries have more formal stylistic parameters that must be followed. For this reason, the translator started with a choice of words of this type of register. A more formal equivalent such as "Warm greetings"<sup>2</sup> was chosen in view of the TL style, which demands fitting the language into a more standard form.

Compensation by splitting was used in the case of the expression *montar*, for example, which in this context, and according to the intention of the author, means to plan something, but a negative connotation is implied since they talk about a scheme. Similarly, the English expression *Put together*<sup>3</sup> renders a conveying meaning, but it differs in the connotation that is being given to it. It adopts a more neutral tone, which is important in a target culture where documentaries are expected to be unbiased.

Another constraint faced by the translator in this rendering process was the use of metaphors by the speakers to emphasize the connotative meaning of words. For instance, the word "**maquinaria**"<sup>4</sup> (in Spanish: mechanism to make a machine work) to refer to "**scheme**<sup>5</sup>" in the target language, which was used in the rendering. The denotation of the presenter's word choice resembles what she actually implies, but she uses a metaphor to emphasize the negative connotation that the word has. It is important to notice that even though the word chosen by the translator also embeds a negative connotation, the metaphoric nuance is replaced by a straightforward counterpart that transmit the wrongdoing together in the immediacy required when dealing with subtitles.

It is also worth mentioning that the deletion technique was used, eliminating the chunk "**al más alto nivel**"<sup>6</sup> both in the target text and the adapted version, which was considered unnecessary and biased for a program presenter, especially in this type of production.

This second passage portrays the use of modulation as a resource to preserve a natural sounding effect in the target language. This technique is applied in the expression "a funcionarios ecuatorianos de la mayor jerarquía"<sup>7</sup> rendered as "to Ecuadorian high-ranking officials"<sup>8</sup>. In a similar way, the term *desenmarañar<sup>9</sup>* means to unravel something, and was rendered as *uncover*, a term which means to discover something previously

secret or unknown. The reason behind this choice lies in the fact that the verb **uncover**<sup>10</sup> fits in the situational context of the text (they are talking about a scheme). In both cases, the naturalness of the phrase is preserved, such thing would have not been possible if the translator had chosen a literal rendering of the phrase.

Particularization is also a technique used by the translator to render the broader noun **dimensión**<sup>11</sup> (translated literally as *dimension*) into a more specific term or hyponym in this case: **massiveness**<sup>12</sup>. In spite of the lack of formality of this term, it compensates the connotative meaning implied in the word of the SL. This choice was made based on the connotation of the word in the source language.

The use of specialized terminology is also worth highlighting in this analysis. It must be clarified that for the present translation, American English was used and, therefore, the legal terms identified in the source text have been rendered within the framework of the American legal system. Hence, since the source and target cultures differ in legal systems, the functions of government officials also present slight variations. In this case, the term *Fiscal General de la Nación*<sup>13</sup> was translated as *Attorney General*<sup>14</sup> to achieve target language equivalence.

In the spotting process of the video script, four captions were used in order to separate the strings of words in a more readable way. Another change made in the adaptation stage was the deletion of the possessiveness in the word *Odebrecht's*<sup>15</sup>, basically due to space and also for emphasis<sup>1</sup> purposes.

The journalistic style is evident in these lines when nouns are used in the form of verbs with a clear intention to continue dramatizing and intensifying the problem. For example, the noun "idea" (meaning idea in the TL) is used as "**idear**<sup>16</sup>" (*to have an idea* in the TL). This particular verb was rendered as *devise* in an attempt to preserve the strength and intentionality of the addresser. In a similar way, the use of the phrase "**máquina de corrupción**"<sup>17</sup> (literally as *corruption machine*) as a metaphor to refer to the

word *scheme* is also a journalistic stylistic resource in the source language, but in the target language, this is not common. In fact, it would obscure understanding for the audience that cannot take time to untangle the meaning of a term since they only have a few seconds to read that string of words. Therefore, compensation by merging was used not only for the accessibility this would give to the subtitles, but also for timing and spacing matters.

It is worth mentioning that the journalist uses words retrieved from general conversational contexts to refer to political situations, such as the one regarding the problem of Ecuador immersed in corruption cases in public contracts. *Salpicado*<sup>18</sup>, which is a particular word used to express that something or someone was wet with drops, turning into *spread*<sup>19</sup>, a more general word meaning to expand or to extend, can be found in this text as examples of generalization, a technique that helps to preserve the natural sound of the text and its meaning.

Something that can be noticed in the transcript is the repetition of the word "**posiblemente**"<sup>20</sup> at the beginning of the utterance, which denotes a reconsideration of the sentence the speaker is about to say. He also interrupts the phrase he was building "**cuando concluya la investigación**"<sup>21</sup> and then he uses the interjection "**que le insisto**"<sup>22</sup>. It is clear that he is improvising during the interview due to the lack of a script or something elaborated to answer the journalist's questions. This posits a challenge for translators at the moment of rendering the ST into the TL. Translators need

to be aware of the parameters established for this type of text at the same time that they strive to create a similar effect on the target audience.

Later on, when subtitling the text, the translator adapts the text through paraphrasing to meet time and space parameters, so the video becomes reader friendly. This can be observed in the phrase "by the time the **investigation ends**<sup>23</sup>, not a simple matter, **it could be a long while**<sup>24</sup>", which is larger in extension than the target text version. The translator finds it convenient to make the decision to replace the interviewee's hesitations, repetitions, and lack of cohesion because of the explanation of other issues through the use of expansion. This restatement of the phrase makes it more understandable for the target audience. Besides, the phrases do not occupy more than two lines and last less than two seconds, parameters already established for readable subtitles.

This string of words presents a difficulty even for Spanish-native speakers who do not possess background knowledge on Finance or Economics. The register is high, and it is implied that the expectation of the speaker is to have a competent audience who can "keep track" on what he has to say. This is shown in the use of the phrase *sucursales, entre comillas, sucursales bancarias internacionales en el país*<sup>25</sup> with no further explanation of what he actually thinks the problem is. The use of the word *bank offshoots*<sup>26</sup>, followed by an explanation (*international finance subsidiaries*<sup>27</sup>) is a technique the translator had to use in order to

compensate for this lack of information, so that the documentary is accessible to a broader audience.

The repetition of the phrase "¿De qué manera?"<sup>28</sup> is used for emphasizing the questions that are being posited by the interviewee. It is clear that he uses this resource to deepen the idea he is exposing. The equivalent "how"<sup>29</sup> was used in order to economize space and to let the phrase be on its own in the caption. This compensates the effect of the words in the source language.

It can be observed that in the source text there are two words (*tema*) that are the same, but that denote different meanings. The term "**tema**"<sup>30</sup> for

the first part refers to the plot that was carried out with Odebrecht, and the second time used, it has a more literal tint than the first. Particularization and generalization were used to find the best equivalents for this word. The words were matched with the terms *scheme*<sup>33</sup> and *issue* respectively. The former is a particular equivalent to refer to a large-scale plan, to put a particular idea into effect. The latter is a more general equivalent which means a subject that people argue or discuss about. These meanings were considered the best matches for the aforementioned term.

The translator also dealt with redundancy in this string. Since the word *tanto* appears many times within the same paragraph, the challenge of translating it more briefly using concise and coherent words is evident so that the idea is preserved and it improves the subtitling process.

Another challenge is encountered within the source text when it is necessary to overcome the absence of an equivalent in the target language. Invented names of people such as *Fulano, Mengano* and *Perencejo<sup>31</sup>* represent a culture-bound constraint. To solve this, the translator looked up words that are culturally accepted in the target language and culture. Therefore, to compensate for the linguistic equivalent, the adaptation of these words into terms such as **John Doe and Jane Doe**<sup>32</sup> was necessary; these are names that used when a person's real name is unknown or when they are intentionally hiding.

The terms in **bold** presented several challenges for the translator at the moment of the transfer process. Despite they are simple words, the author is trying to convey a more complex meaning than what is read at first sight. The political and the formal contexts change the simplicity of these words to give them a deeper meaning. For instance, the word "horrores"<sup>34</sup> replaces the errores, which means "things done incorrectly", but the actual connotation given to the term goes beyond that denotative meaning because it is being replaced by a word that could be easily translated as *horror*. In this context, this word refers to bad decisions and bad intentions from people who are involved in corruption cases, and not only common people, but people who are in charge of important issues of the country. Finding an equivalent that denoted the importance of the word *horrores* was a challenge faced by the translator. To tackle the problem weakness on the expression, an adjective was used next to the word: huge. The expression was rendered into *Huge mistakes*<sup>35</sup>. It was applied to produce a rendering which conveys a similar effect on the audience and fits the style of the target language.

Likewise, the phrase "los vamos a decir"<sup>36</sup> not only means that the speakers are going to reveal their "mistakes", but also that something more

serious and formal as presenting a written report or complaint before the press would be done. In the target language, *decir* means to say or to speak something. This expression must be substituted by rendering a similar effect considering the level of formality used in this type of text. The translator considered the term *state* a good match since it means "to set forth formally in speech or writing."

The use of paraphrasing was necessary to render the term **solvencia**<sup>37</sup>, which is a general noun meaning economic sufficiency, but that in this specific case is used for expressing that any accusation must be held with evidence. It was matched with the word **properly**<sup>38</sup>, which is more appropriate for the present situational context.

This string of words refers to the money used for bribery which was sent from country to country, for this reason, the term "**agendaba**"<sup>39</sup> might seem confusing, so a different choice of words was made to render it. The use of the impersonal mode, very common in Spanish, represents another challenge for the translator. **"It was sent**"<sup>40</sup> is regarded as a proper decision to tackle this problem. The technique used is compensation by splitting.

In Spanish the word "**interviniente**"<sup>41</sup> could refer to someone who intervenes or participates in something, not so in English; the word intervener refers to someone who intervenes as a third party in a legal proceeding. It was necessary to use generalization employing the word "**participants**"<sup>42</sup> which fits well to convey the same idea of the ST.

In both English and Spanish, the term **natural person**<sup>44</sup> is used for referring to a person with a personal identity who may or may not carry out commercial activities. The technique employed was compensation by merging due to the fact that the challenge in this case is to be able to compensate for all this set of words **"personas con nombre y apellido y cédula de identidad"**<sup>43</sup> in a shorter term and containing the same semantic connotation.

In this line it is possible to appreciate the appearance of great redundancy for the terms "companies" and "shareholders". The source language speaker uses circumlocution, so the challenge presented when translating is to shorten this way of speaking in order to convey something less redundant and clearer. The technique used in this string is adaptation; the words "**companies**"<sup>44</sup>, "**other**"<sup>45</sup> are used, which evoke the same term. The same happens with "**shareholders**"<sup>46</sup>, it is not repeated but "**others**"<sup>47</sup> is also used.

A challenge encountered in this segment is to be able to render the term "**conocido**"<sup>48</sup> of the SL matching its meaning in context with a word or words in the TL. It is necessary to go beyond the semantic meaning and investigate in the target culture the expression that could imply the semantic scope of the word. Compensation by splitting was the recourse in this case.

The expressions used later in the segment analyzed now have an invisible element conveyed only while watching the documentary. The person who expresses this phrase "**parte de aquí para abajo**"<sup>49</sup> y "**parte de aquí para arriba**"<sup>50</sup> does it with gestures pointing with his hand his neck and then moving it down and then he does it pointing from his neck moving his hand up. This gives a clear understanding that the text refers to hierarchical levels,

both medium and low vs. high (middle and higher levels) involved in the corruption scheme.

Finding an equivalent for the aforementioned words in the TL required an analysis of the specific situation and the body language. Thus, "conocido", a term meaning to have deep information or knowledge with direct experience about something was matched with "heard the story"<sup>51</sup>, a phrase which expresses what politicians have revealed so far to the Ecuadorians about Odebrecht. It is important to highlight that, since the participants in the interview have knowledge about body language, this is linked to their professions,<sup>3</sup> there are some parts of the interviews in which they tend to use visual resources such as hand signals accompanied by a literal description of the movement they perform, but that has a different connotation. For example, when an interviewee says "parte de aquí para abajo", he refers to a hierarchical level of management from middle to operational managements levels, and it was translated as "middle level downward" as a compensation (by merging) using the term "level." Aquí para arriba" refers to a hierarchical higher level of management. It was matched with "higher levels", compensation by merging was employed through the use of the term "level".

# 10. CONCLUSIONS

The Ecuadorian television industry is capable of producing quality programs that can reach international audiences through methods such as subtitling, a type of audiovisual translation that increases accessibility not only to communities who speak other languages, but also to people with hearing problems.

The communicative method was used to render this Ecuadorian documentary. It is aimed to achieve a similar effect and impact in both source and target audience. The use of this method also makes the product accessible to a broader audience.

There is a diverse array of strategies and techniques used in the rendering of the Visión 360 documentary. Effective use of compensation by merging and splitting were used as well as expansion to tackle most of the constraints presented by the type of document.

The most common problems found in the subtitling of a documentary are related to technical limitations such as time and space of the text in each caption and the use of specialized terminology, factors that play an important role in the translation process and the final product.

The translator's awareness of the type of document to be transferred is necessary to produce quality work. In a similar way, the division of the subtitling process into stages contributes to streamline translators' performance and enhances their decision-making methodology.
